May 28, 1903, Lafayette M. Veatch,
aged 63 years, 2 months and 4 days,
after a long illness.
Lafayette Veatch was born in
White county, Illinois, March 24,
1840, and moved to Davis county,
Iowa, with his parents in 1845. He
was married to Miss Kliza R. Scott
April 3, 1864 and came to Oregon the
same year. The following year he
took up the homestead where he has
resided until his death. He was a
man of sterling worth, an honest, en-
ergetic upright citizen, genial and un-
assuming and we think we can truth-
fully say that he knew no enemies.
He was a man of high moral character
and to know him was to regard him
in the highest esteem. He was a
good neighbor, a true friend, a kind
and indulgent father, and a faithful
and loving husband. He leaves a
wife and four children, three boys
and one girl, one daughter having
died June 10, 1891. In his death a
