## COUNCIL MEETING

### Legislation Against Bicyclists and Chickens.

The council met in regular monthly session Monday evening with a full attendance of the city officers and considerable business was transacted.

A petition prohibiting bicyclists from riding on sidewalk in the city limits was read and the recorder was ordered to prepare an ordinance as prayed for by petitioners.

The report of committee on Wynne alley recommending deferring action until November 1903, was accepted.

Ordinance No. 68 prohibiting chickens and other domestic fowls from running at large in the city limits was introduced and passed.

The marshal was instructed to have the shooting gallery on main street fix up a more substantial backdrop otherwise to move the tent.

### In Justice Vaughn's Court.

Two cases came up for a hearing in Justice Vaughn's court this week, the first being entitled, The State vs. Jas. Hollingsworth and Geo. Rowen, upon charge of larceny. The complaint was filed by Section Foreman Wm. Moore, of Creswell, who alleged that defendants rifled his pockets of money in the sum of \$135. Deputy district attorney Harris represented the state and upon being arraigned before the Justice Tuesday the defendants waived examination and were bound over to the circuit court in the sum of \$500 and being unable to furnish bonds were taken to Eugene Wednesday and lodged in the county jail.

Tuesday the case entitled The State vs. B. Land, also came up for a hearing in the justice court, upon a complaint filed by Supt. Wood of the O & S E railroad charging defendant with willfully and maliciously obstructing the railroad by building a fence across the track. Defendant alleged that the company had agreed to allow him to place a temporary fence across the track until a cattle guard was constructed and failing to put in the cattle guard he maintained a fence across the track to protect his growing crops. After examining several witnesses the case was submitted for argument, Deputy District Attorney Brown representing the state and Attorney J. C. Johnson the defendant. After taking the case under advisement briefly the court found the defendant not guilty and he was promptly discharged.
