Number of teachers employed:

certificates or diplomas: Male, 1;
female, 4; total, 5.

Number of persons between 4 and
20 years old not attending any
school, 83.

The report shows that 9 months
school has been taught during
year, and that there is about 300
voters for school purposes in
district.
