THE SAGINAW SAWMILLS.

The Work of Removing Mill No. 2 Stopped—To Sell Mill No. 1.

SAWMILL FOR SALE.

As will be noted in another column in today's LEADER the Booth-Kelly Lumber Company is advertising to sell one of their sawmills. The mill in question is the Saginaw mill No. 2, which was put out of commission some time ago by the company.

It is a small mill of about 35,000 feet capacity, and having no further use for a small concern the company deemed it best to sell, that is a greater part of it.

WILL NOT MOVE MILL NO. 1

Mill No. 1, of Saginaw, which was to have been moved to a new location on Gittings Creek and the work preparatory to moving the same was well under way, will remain where it is at present. R. A. Booth was at Saginaw Friday and ordered the work stopped. There is still considerable timber in the vicinity of the mill and it will be some time before it is moved to its new location.
