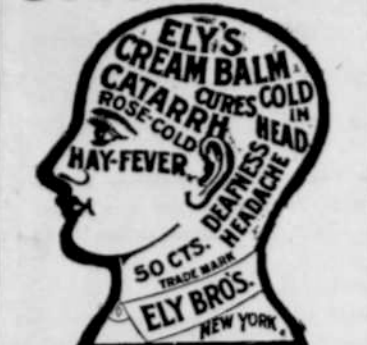
New Zealand Shipping Laws.

A new set of shipping regulations recently formulated in New Zealand gives proof of the maternal care with which the government looks after the welfare of the people. Every seagoing vessel that can be controlled by the local authority must for the future carry a boat or raft fully fitted up with provisions for use in case of accident. Provision is to be made for a supply of fresh water and of beef, biscuits, chocolate, tabloids and lime juice and also of fishing lines and hooks and safety matches. So many desperate tragedies have occurred around the New Zealand coast from time to time after shipwrecks through the difficulty of getting living necessities into the boats in the rush and excitement of escaping that the new regulation in this regard seems to be a wise precaution. It is noteworthy that neither rum nor tobacco is included in the items of this novel "manifest."
