NEW LUMBER COMPANY.

Wildwood Lumber Company Files Articles of Incorporation.

Saturday articles of incorporation of the Wildwood Lumber Company were filed with the county clerk.

The incorporators are John Hunter, J. S. Hamilton and J. S. Medley and the principal office and place of business is at Cottage Grove. The capital stock is \$20,000, of which \$7500 is set aside as treasury stock.

The object of the corporation as set forth in the articles are to engage in general lumbering and logging business, etc., and to carry on a general or special banking business. The company has property at the Hunt mill site at Wildwood, up the railroad to the Bohemia mines, where their plant will be located. The newly formed and incorporated company expects to begin active operations early in the spring and build up vicinity thriving enterprise in this vicinity during the coming season.
