assessors are elected and qualified."

The report was adopted and rousing addresses were made by H. D. Edwards, J. R. Hill, W. Kuykendall, L. T. Harris, Jerry Atkinson, J. V. O'Leary, W. A. Maltman, J. M. Shelley, S. M. Yoran, A. S. Powers and others, some of whom paid a well merited compliment to the Grange for its able advocacy of good roads. Commissioner Hill wanted the commissioners' court abolished, all grafts eliminated and four supervisors elected to superintend road building in the county. The general expression was for method and system in road construction.

On suggestion of Dr. Kuykendall, ably seconded by Hon. L. T. The meeting held two hours and was full of interest throughout. At the close those present voluntarily added their names to the membership roll. It is a move in the proper direction.

FRUIT GROWERS MEETING

Association to be Formed. Capital Stock, \$10,000. With Shares at \$25 Each to Fruit Raisers.

Thirty-five enthusiastic fruit growers met Saturday in Frank's hall at Eugene for the purpose of organizing a fruitgrowers' association.

F. B. Chase presided and C. M. Densmore acted as secretary. J. R. Shepard of Salem, one of the most prominent fruitgrowers in the state, was present, representing the Willamette Valley Prune Association. He explained fully the workings of his association, its advantages, etc. The new association will be formed similar to the Willamette Valley Association B. A. Washburne of Springfield, W. O. Zeigler and C. M. Densmore of Eugene were appointed a committee to draw up a constitution and by-laws. The capital stock will be placed at \$10,000. Shares will be \$25 each, and will be sold only to fruitgrowers.

Monday, April 11 the next meeting of the fruitgrowers will be held at Frank's hall, Eugene, to adopt constitution and elect officers. The Cottage Grove precinct was ably represented by John Hull, at the temporary organization.
