Trials Run of Oregon Securities Company's
Big Plant Most Satisfactory.

G. B. Hengen, president of the
Oregon Securities Co. and the Oregon
& Southeastern Railroad Co.,

from Portland and Seattle accompanied
by Mrs. Hengen. He informs
the LEADER that the water was turned
on at their big electric power
plant in Bohemia this week and
everything was found to work like a
charm, a few leaks in the water
pipes, however, causing a slight delay,
while they are being repaired.
Mr. Hengen will be met by Supt.
C. C. Mathews from the mines today
and a conference will be held regarding
the beginning of operations
and all plans for an active season's
operations in the mines will be perfected,
and arrangements for resuming
construction work on the railroad
to complete the line into the
mines this season will also be made.

give the Bohemia mining district
and Cottage Grove a renewed
impetus. Mr. Hengen will spend
considerable time in Cottage Grove
and the mines this season personally
directing the affairs of his
company's great mining operations
and railroad building.
