Lewis and Clark Centennial.

Portland's Exposition will represent a total outlay of over \$5,000,000. Though covering 405 acres of land and natural lake, it will be compact in form, and the average person will be able to see and comprehend it all in a few days at moderate cost. The cream of the former foreign and domestic exhibits to be made at St. Louis this year will be transferred to Portland at the close of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition.

The United States exhibit will be moved entire to Portland and installed in buildings to be specially erected. This exhibit will be worth \$800,000. In addition, Portland will have many features which will not be seen at St. Louis, such as exhibits demonstrating the life, customs and industries of China, Japan, Hawaii, Siberia, Russia, Alaska, Australia, New Zealand, the Philippines and India.

Pioneer Conductor Dead.

Frank Guthrie, who will be remembered by many Willamette Valley people as one of the old Oregon & California and Southern Pacific conductors, was buried at Portland on the 21st having died at Deloris, Calif., a few days ago. The funeral was largely attended by many of his old railroad friends. All the old and young employees who knew Frank, had a warm spot in their heart for him. The pall bearers were: M. C. Webster, W. J. Sally, P. H. Tynan, Geo. Hardy, M. V. Young, H. L. Froggatt, these being selected by chief conductor S. Veatch of Mt Hood Division 91, they being some of his oldest and best friends, some of whom were at one time his fellow brakemen, conductors and engineers. Thus we go one by one.
