

It now appears that a more suitable brick will be built on the vacant corner of the Wall lot adjoining the present building, for banking purposes by Dr. Paine and his associates. Lots have been purchased of Dr. Wall and a new building will be erected. This will make the second bank for our southern neighbor, which is one of the busiest and best and most progressive towns in Oregon.


