JUSTIFIABLE HOMICIDE

and had threatened to kill.

Trouble had existed between Poitras and Elliott for some time. There homesteads were adjoining and trouble began over the division line. Poitras claiming Elliott had built a fence on his (Poitras') land four feet over the line.

On Saturday young Elliott was slashing brush near the line, and about one o'clock in the afternoon Poitras drove up behind him in a car and called to him to quit slashing there or "he would lick him." Poitras then fastened his reins and got out of the car. Elliott said that Poitras drew a revolver and he heard him say he was going to kill him.

Elliott dropped to the ground and also drew his revolver, a .32 calibre Colts, from the breast of shirt and fired at Poitras, who was thirty feet away, and who turned toward his car staggering and falling. Elliott then told his people what he had done and sent word to the county officials.

Witnesses testified that they went to view the body of Poitras after the killing and he was lying on his pistol, which was partly in view and it was loaded with five shells. Others said that they had seen the old man have a revolver which he carried in

his hip pocket when he left Creswell. The coroner could not find any weapons about the dead man, and it is presumed that it was stolen.

When Elliott was being examined by Deputy District Attorney Harris he said that he had carried a gun for several years, and more especially for the past two years as he feared trouble from Poitras and was always prepared to meet it. He had no particular trouble with the man and had but a few words before the shooting.

CORONER'S JURY VERDICT.

After the testimony was given the coroner's jury found the following verdict:

"Lorane, Ore., May 22, 1904.

"We, the jury in this case, find that Louis Poitras, aged 52 years, came to his death by internal hemorrhage, caused by a gun shot fired by Archie Elliott; and furthermore, we find that the evidence given indicates that the shot was fired in self defence.

WAS ECCENTRIC.

He had threatened to kill Elliott, as well as others in the vicinity, and the tragedy of Saturday afternoon was not unlooked for.

Archie Elliott is a young man about 25 years of age, with his mother, works hard and bears a very good reputation as far as can be learned.

It seems queer to the public that a mere misunderstanding over the boundary line between the two homesteads would justify such a shooting affair, but from the evidence given and general report from those who know the parties concerned the jury was perfectly right in exonerating Elliott, as Poitras would surely have done some shooting had not the younger man been the quicker with his gun.
