Gold bars were sent to Europe last week valued at \$10,000,000. Another shipment amounted to \$9,000,000. Most of the recent \$10,000,000 of the Japanese loan in this country will be exported in gold. Then there are \$5,000,000 of the Russian war loan to be paid. The outward movement of gold which began April 7th now amounts to \$52,500,000. The arrival in Paris of \$9,000,000 of this gold drew an immense crowd and great excitement. It amounted to 178 barrels of gold, carried on immense freight cars.

The school board held a meeting last Saturday for the purpose of selecting teachers for the ensuing school year in the Cottage Grove public and high schools, and the following named teachers were employed:

Prof. A. L. Briggs, the retiring principal, has very ably, efficiently and successfully conducted the public schools of this city for the past three years. He has not only been thorough in his educational work, but has inspired much pride in beautifying the public school grounds, which through his energy and enterprise have been converted into a beautiful flower garden. He has also been untiring in his efforts to build up a good school library in which he has succeeded admirably as well as having secured many appropriate pictures to hang on the walls of the public school building. He has also been a factor in the advocacy of an additional school building and worked diligently to secure a bond issue through a special election to be used for this purpose, the bonds having been voted in the sum of \$10,000, work on the six room school building having already been commenced. Prof. Briggs has not only proven himself a thoroughly competent and up-to-date educator, but also an enterprising and public spirited citizen.

Worthy of special mention also is the efficient services rendered by the able assistants of Prof. Briggs during the past school year, the schools being fortunate in having a most able and competent corps of teachers.

The newly elected principal, Prof. G. H. Dunn, hails from California and comes to this city very highly recommended as a practical and thoroughly up-to-date educator and a splendid gentleman, whom the LEADER joins in extending a most cordial welcome to this city.

SKIPWORTH—At his home in Eugene, May 31, 1904, Hon. E. R. Skipworth of tuberculosis. He was a prominent and well known attorney and democratic politician and was highly esteemed throughout the county. The funeral took place at the family residence Wednesday being attended by many friends and relatives.

Rev. Wire of Albany officiated and delivered an eloquent tribute to the memory of the deceased. Interment was in the I. O. O. F. cemetery at Eugene.

HUNTLY—At San Diego, Cal., May 30, 1904, Mrs. E. J. Huntly. Deceased was born in Tennessee, Nov. 2, 1835, and with her parents crossed the plains to Oregon in 1845 and located permanently near Yoncalla in 1849. She was married June 13, 1851 to D. C. Underwood, to which union eight children were born, seven of whom survive their parents. They are Mrs. Geo. Wall and Miss Anna Underwood of this city; Mrs. Geo. Small, Silver Lake; John Underwood, Rapid City, S. D. Mrs. Alice Johnson and Mrs. C. A. Hubbard, San Diego, Cal., and H. E. Underwood, city marshal of this city.

Mr. Underwood died in August 1882 and later, Mrs. Underwood married C. A. Huntly and moved to San Diego, where Mr. Huntly died several years ago. Mrs. Huntly was a grand old pioneer lady and was held in the highest esteem by all who knew her. Funeral services were held at San Diego Thursday, the remains being interred at that place.
