That fish, cold-blooded as they are, can be frozen and thawed back to life if not exposed to the sun or not allowed to get more than twelve to fourteen degrees below the freezing-point is asserted in the Medical Times on the strength of a series of experiments recently made by the Washington State Fishery Commission. "If exposed to a temperature of zero they will not survive. Fish can be taken from the Columbia River and the Alaskan waters in a frozen condition and resuscitated in other rivers and lakes, or carried to any part of the world under the same conditions with the same results."
