LEADERS IN MERCHANDISING

Activity at Depot.

During the past week there has been a force of men engaged at the Southern Pacific depot, improving the wagon approach to the station. Several cars of gravel were handled by the men in a few hours with the result that the area west of the freight sheds is now covered to a depth of six or eight inches—an assurance of good surface for hauling during the wet weather. Appearances are greatly improved by the addition of the gravel. Work on the siding is going steadily and the track is being raised to the level of the main line. Freight business at Cottage Grove during the week just ended has been large. Many agricultural implements and farm wagons have been in the cargo, showing activity in farming lines. Quantities of barbed wire fencing and general hardware have been listed in the freight. On the O. & S. E. R. R. supplies for the mines at Bohemia have been constantly going forward. The stage line to Bohemia, under direction of Lewis & McQueen, began making regular trips on Monday, carrying the mail.

Eugene K. of P. Coming.

On next Wednesday afternoon, on the local grounds in Long & Bingham's Add., there will be a base ball game of more than ordinary interest. It will be the second of a series of games arranged between the team from the Eugene Knights of Pythias Lodge and a team from the local lodge of the same Order of this place.
