Chimney Fire.

An alarm of fire Monday morning at 11:40 was for a blaze in the home of Mrs. Kate Perkins on Main street on the east side of the railroad tracks. Members of the family ran across to the home of L. H. Bingham and gave the alarm. By telephone the fire department was called out and a general alarm given. Ben Bingham, who happened to be at home, took the garden hose and went across to the rear of the Perkins home. He was joined a moment later by Frank McFarland. Together they climbed to the roof of the kitchen annex and had the flames under control before the fire men arrived. The blaze was caused by a defective flue, the fault being between the ceiling and the roof. Shingling was torn away by the energetic young men on the roof, whose timely arrival prevented a possibly serious fire. The volunteer department arrived promptly and made good time in laying a line to the scene. There is need of a hydrant at the corner mentioned; for the first cart had insufficient hose to reach the flames had it been necessary and had to wait for the company, from across the river to get on the ground, before a stream could have been in action.

Young Man Advanced.

Edward Jacobson, who has been for the past thirteen months in charge of the freight and baggage department at the local depot, has been advanced to a position in the Portland general freight department as clerk. Having proved his ability in the railroad service this young man has received due recognition and advancement. Season for Pheasants.

Under opinion rendered by Attorney General Crawford, the bill prohibiting the killing of Chinese pheasants for three years failed to pass State Game Warden J. W. Baker has announced his intention of taking the decision of the Attorney General as final in the matter and advises sportsmen that pheasants may be killed as under the old law. The season opens October 1st and closes the last day of November. During the last fifteen days of November only, can these game birds be sold.

Portland is to have a \$500,000 packing plant in connection with the campaign of the Independent Packing Company against the beef trust. This announcement was made last week by officers of the National Live Association, who will journey to Portland for the meeting July 9th, when preliminary arrangements will be completed.

Prizes for Best Articles on Oregon.

Any person in the State of Oregon can contribute articles in competition for the following prizes:

The Portland Commercial Club offers two gold medals and \$200 in cash prizes for articles on Oregon, under the following conditions:

For the best article appearing in the regular edition of any newspaper or other publication printed outside of the state of Oregon, to be competed for only by persons residing in Oregon and not living in the city of Portland, choice of a gold medal or \$50 in cash.

For the second best article, either the gold medal or \$50 in cash, depending upon selection made by the winner of first prize.

Article winning third prize will be given \$25. Fourth prize will be \$15, the fifth prize \$10.

To residents of Portland a gold medal and \$100 will be distributed in prizes upon exactly the same basis as the gold medal and \$100 are to be distributed to residents of Oregon outside of Portland.

The reason for having these articles printed outside of the state is that we want the people away from home to know our advantages, and then we desire the Portland and Oregon papers to be relieved from any embarrassment that might arise through having to decline articles. Articles containing the expression "Webfoot" will not be allowed to compete.

The Governor of the state will be asked to appoint a committee to decide as to the winners in the state contest, while the Mayor of Portland will be requested to name the committee that will select the winners in this city.

One of the chief reasons for offering these prizes is to give the younger generation an opportunity to do some pleasant work during vacation. This is a busy age and no article is desired exceeding five thousand words—those of about one thousand words preferred.

No article will be accepted in competition except where the newspaper or other publication is submitted complete. The articles submitted become the property of the Portland Commercial Club, to be used as desired.

The contest closes October 1, 1904.

We believe that there will be an interesting competition for these prizes, and feel sure that many newspapers throughout the United States, Canada, Mexico and other countries will be glad to secure interesting matter relative to the most fertile state in the Pacific Northwest. Articles in any language will be accepted.
