Fourth of July in the Philippines.

On the Fourth of July the Filipino "outyankees" the most patriotic Yankee that ever lived. He has taken the day to his heart, and is as joyous over it as a boy over his first firecracker, and while perhaps he is yet a trifle hazy as to the exact importance of the event in American history, he is perfectly clear on the subject of flags, and he is perfectly aware of the good time possible on this day. In Manila all the business houses are draped with starry bunting, and the ancient palaces are bright with the Stars and Stripes, and even the boats in the harbor are decked with "Old Glory." Towering arches, generally of bamboo, are erected in the streets and strung with flags and portraits of our national heroes. In the smaller Philippine towns, where flags cannot be had, these arches are often made of cotton cloth and decorated with wreaths and suitable inscription.

The Filipinos have also adopted a great many of the amusements that used to mark the Fourth in our old New England towns. Chinning a greased pole in the public square is almost always a feature of Independence Day in Manila. And besides these, there are various athletic games instituted by our soldiers, and usually participated in by the younger Spaniards and natives. The evening of the Fourth always sees a band concert on the Luneta, and the day ends, as with us, with fireworks—Woman's Home Companion.

To the citizens of Cottage Grove: It will be remembered that after much agitation and a constant demand, a regulation sidewalk was constructed from the city limits to the Masonic and I. O. O. F. cemetery last winter by public contributions, a local committee devoting much time to this commendable enterprise in the face of many obstacles and discouragements. Upon its completion this much needed improvement was recognized as a most important, substantial and timely one by every citizen of the town and the committee was commended for its enterprise in vigorously pushing the work to completion. It was recognized as an improvement which would be appreciated by the townspeople the year around, from the fact that it enables them to reach the cemetery in the winter regardless of the muddy condition of the road and in the summer without traveling in the dusty road, and this improvement has been a direct incentive to the beautifying of the cemetery and otherwise improving this beautiful and sightly burial ground. After exhausting all of its resources and the funds provided for the splendid public improvement this sidewalk committee is confronted by a deficiency of over \$75 which it is unable to provide without the co-operation of the fraternal orders owning the cemetery or the public spirited citizens of Cottage Grove, in providing an entertainment or some other means to wipe out the indebtedness, the payment of which the creditors promise to enforce against the sidewalk committee. We therefore submit this statement to the citizens of Cottage Grove and earnestly solicit their co-operation in devising ways and means to wipe out the remaining indebtedness held against the cemetery sidewalk committee.
