PROGRESS NOTES.

What the Lumber Companies are Doing and to Do.

Shortridge mill on the Coast Fork is building an addition, adding a big planer and otherwise improving their property.

McKibben Lumber Co's new spur from the O. & S. E. tracks was laid last week to connect with the new flume. This company is preparing to turn out quantities of lumber this season.

T. K. Campbell of Pacific Timber Co. spent Saturday at Roseburg, looking after concerns of the company he represents. Mills at Alca are running steadily, local demand for lumber being good. Prospect for shipping demand is good.

Dorena Lumber Company is building a dry kiln similar to that of the Long & Bingham mill at Cottage Grove. Work is progressing well, sides are up and gate ends will be built during this week. This mill will do all kinds of finishing, turning out rustic, ceiling, flooring and stepping lumber.

Manager A. B. Wood of the O. & S. E. railroad has been at the terminus during this week. Three miles of grading has been finished. Track-laying will begin as soon as ties can be supplied. A new siding for shipment of piling timbers has been placed at Rocky Point. These piles are being shipped to West Oakland, California for use by the Santa Fe system.

John Hunter, president of the Wildwood Lumber Company, is supervising construction of their new mill at the present terminus of the O. & S. E. railroad. Machinery is now on the ground, having come this week. Preliminary capacity of the mill will be 35,000 feet of lumber daily. Completed capacity between 50,000 and 60,000 feet. Framework is in place and the mill will be in operation within one month.
