Dont Start Fires.

Governor Chamberlain's proclamation warning people against starting fires has been published. Annual issuance of the proclamation is provided for by law. It is prescribed that if any person either on his own land or that of another, sets out a fire by which the fences, crops or other property of another are damaged or destroyed, he shall be fined \$20 to \$1,000, or imprisoned three months to a year. If any person starts a fire on the land of another whereby the same shall spread and do damage to buildings or other property, including wood or timber land, not his own, he shall be fined \$10 to \$100 and costs. If any person while hunting or fishing shall kindle a fire on the lands of another without the consent of the owner he shall be fined \$10 to \$100; or if such fire be kindled maliciously the fine shall be \$20 to \$250 or imprisonment three months to one year. If any person set fire to any wooded country or forest of the United States or the state of Oregon, he shall be fined \$100 or not exceeding \$1,000 or be imprisoned not exceeding one year, or both. In any prosecution for the above, one-half the fines go to the informant, and the balance to the school fund.
