Fire Alarm Signals.

At a meeting of the Council Monday evening Ordinance No. 80 was passed. It provides a schedule of the alarms, as follows:

For a fire on the east side of the Coast Fork river and south of Main street the alarm shall be one stroke of the bell repeated at intervals.

For a fire on the east side and north of Main street the alarm shall be two strokes of the bell repeated at intervals.

For a fire on the west side and south of Wall street, the alarm shall be three strokes of the bell repeated. For a fire on the west side and north of Wall street, the alarm shall be four strokes of the bell repeated. Cut this out and pin it on the wall for reference.

A gasoline tank exploded in the ironing room and one of the employees was severely burned about the head. The burning gasoline was extinguished by a few buckets of water and wet blankets.

The injured young man was taken to the Imperial Hotel where Dr. B. R. Job attended him. He was taken to Eugene on the night train where he will be cared for by the F. O. Eagles, of which lodge he is a member. Damage at the laundry was slight.

STREET IMPROVEMENT CASES ARE DECIDED

Obstruction of Litigants Removed by
Decision of Circuit Court.

The cases of Thos. Allen et al. vs. the City of Cottage Grove and Chas. Bruenau et al. vs. the City of Cottage Grove, relating to the collection of street assessments on Main and Wall Streets which have been pending in the Circuit Court for some time, have been decided by Judge Hamilton in favor of the city.

These cases being thus disposed of, property owners will be required to pay their assessments for grading and graveling of streets on which work is ordered by the City Council. These improvements should not be considered by owners as a hardship, for the work so done is a direct addition to the value of the property. Every street improved increases the market price of the frontage so improved.
