New 90-pound steel rails impor-
ted from Germany by the Southern

quality, with the result that the
rails on the sharp curves in the
canyon are already worn, and it
will be but a short time until the
rails must be changed. Upon many
of the curves the ball of the rail is
so badly worn as to allow the flange
of the car wheels to cut the outer
edge of the angle bars, which have
suspended the old-time fish plates
for connecting the rails."—Guard.

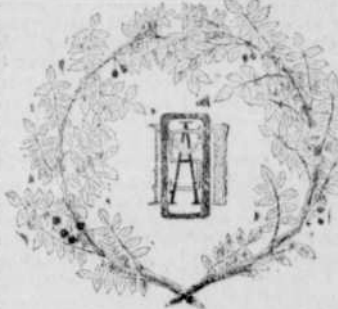
