To Shorten Time Schedule.

Effort will be made to have the time schedule for mails to the Bohemia district extended to cover the arrival of trains from Cottage Grove at Wildwood station in order to facilitate the delivery of the mail at the end of the routes. It is understood that Congressman Biniger Hermann favors continuation of two routes from Wildwood as formerly, one to Bohemia via Mineral, the other to Orasco via Bonita. The total distance to be traversed under the system proposed and advocated by Congressman Hermann will be 37 miles. Under the plan for which bids have been asked by the department the distance would be 33 miles over two routes. The plan proposed by Congressman Hermann affords two separate and distinct routes from Wildwood and the aggregate distance is only four miles more than the other. The plan of Mr. Hermann should be favored, but there should be an absolute demand for a change in the mail schedule at Wildwood, to allow the carrier to receive mails from the morning train and thus avoid the delay of 24 hours that is indicated as the present schedule stands.

To Make the Hair Fluffy.

To make the hair fluffy without curling it moisten it with a preparation of two grams of alcohol or rectified spirits of wine, one ounce of eau de cologne, half an ounce of bicarbonate of soda and four ounces of rose water. Every night rub every inch of the scalp with cold water, using a clean nail brush, if you want to keep the hair in good condition. Once a week use a tonic. An excellent one is made of one pint of alcohol, one ounce of sweet oil and one dram of tincture of cantharides. Use a few drops of any essence preferred to perfume it.
