Going to Los Angeles.

Dr. Geo. Wall will remove with his family to Los Angeles next month. This step is taken not from a desire to leave Cottage Grove, but by the advice of a number of physicians with whom he has consulted and who have advised the change.

Some ten years ago Dr. Wall had an attack of rheumatism which confined him to his home for some weeks. He however recovered sufficiently to resume office practice and has associated with him, Dr. Clyde T. Hockett. Dr. Wall has been district surgeon for the Southern Pacific railroad and was surgeon for the Blackbutte Quicksilver Mines. He has been Vice President and is now President of the Lane County Medical Society and has taken great interest in the Masonic, K. of P. and Foresters organizations.

The Dr. says while he regrets the necessity of disposing of his property and moving to other climes, he finds the hardest of all is to separate from the many warm friends he has made during his residence in the city. Dr. Clyde T. Hockett will succeed to the practice. The latter gentleman has in the past few months built up an extensive practice and is a practitioner of the first order.
