The committee which has in hand the matter of bringing before the coming Legislature the incorporation of that part of the Bohemia district now in Douglas county into Lane county reported that the matter was progressing very satisfactorily. F. J. Hard, one of the Bohemia Mine Owners Association to act on this matter, being present stated that his committee were collecting data relative to the boundary and there is no doubt the matter will be presented before the coming Legislature by the joint committees, so that favorable action will be taken.

The matter of the bearing local option will have from a financial standpoint on the city was taken up and thoroughly discussed and the Club not being in favor of taking any action as a club the matter in its entirety was laid on the table.

The debate on the matter brought forth some advocates both for and against the proposition and was productive of a great deal of information.

It is the intention of the Club in the near future to have printed and adopted a letter head setting forth the advantages of Cottage Grove, what we have, what we need and what we can do for the party coming to this section of the county to settle and when this matter is presented to the merchants no doubt they will take hold and help push the town along by giving their cooperation to the plan.

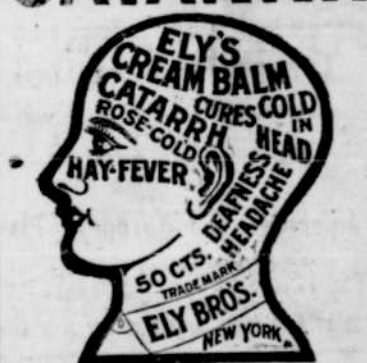
