To Discover Gold By Telephone.

Among the scientific notes in Collier's for October 15 is the following announcement:

A new way of prospecting has been tried experimentally, and is reaching the point where it is practically useful. The method is based on the difference in the electrical conductivity in the earth due to the presence of ore deposits. Most ores are much better conductors of electricity than the soil and rock, although some others are almost insulators.

In making use of these facts to locate beds of ore two electrodes are grounded about 100 yards apart. In the circuit is an induction coil with a glass condenser and two spark gaps. The current as it passes through the ground is tested by two telephone receivers connected to portable electrodes which are usually grounded about 70 feet apart. The make and break of the current in passing through the ground is heard in the telephone as ticks. As the electrodes attached to the telephones are moving about, the variations in the intensity of the tapping in the telephones gives an indication of the presence and position of the ore deposits. Although the method is not out of the experimental stage, yet it seems to promise much for itself in the future.

All in Good Order

Mr. A. A. Buchanan who has been employed at the Oregon Securities mine in Bohemia for some months arrived in the city on Friday and Saturday went on to Portland for a short rest and visit. Mr. Buchanan has been completing and putting into good running order the tramway which reaches from the 30 stamp mill to the main working tunnel up the mountain. He reports it as being ready for use as a thorough test has been made. He also states that since the increased supply of water, caused by the recent rains, which furnishes double power for the electric plant the force in the tunnel has been increased and the power drills are kept busy night and day. The Champion vein, he says, will be reached within a month or six weeks. When ore can be supplied to the mill by tram. Preparations are being made, Mr. Buchanan states, for the winter, by this Company as well as others and the heavy storms cannot retard work as they did last year when operators were caught unprepared by the early storms.

Mineral King and Homestake.

A. W. Ziniker is in the city for a few days. During the summer he has been, with several others, developing his properties on Horse Heaven creek in Bohemia district. He reports that a cross-cut was run to cut the Mineral King lode which when reached disclosed a fair sized vein that prospects by panning very high in gold. The Homestake tunnel follows the vein into the mountain a distance of 120 feet. In order to determine the width of the ledge, cross-cuts were driven and the walls were found to be 50 feet apart. A good portion of the ledge being a milling ore.

Recently Mr. Ziniker has been working for the May Flower Mining and Milling Company and confirms the statements recently made concerning this property, as he considers it, one of the best showing properties in the district. He will make arrangements while here to remain in camp all winter and prosecute work on his claims.

In Early Days.

In early days—before the codlin moth—Williamette valley apples held the reputation all over the coast. Now the high and cold country east of the Cascade mountains is far in the lead, not perhaps because of better fruit, but through neglect of old valley orchards and failure to set out new ones to any considerable extent, the large planting of pines no doubt being responsible in a great degree for overlooking the more reliable apples. As an instance of what Eastern Oregon is doing in the apple business three hundred carloads will be shipped from LaGrande and Union, in the Grand River valley, this season.

Back From Tonopah.

Messrs Courts and Church who some weeks ago started on a trip through Northern California and portions of Nevada returned to the city on Sunday. During their absence they visited Tonopah and Goldfield and speak highly of them as great mining districts.

They agree however with recently published reports that it is not the place for the poor man to go to at the present time. It is not because of the lack of mines in that section but the lack of transportation to move the ores.

In their opinion it will be ample time to think of going there next spring or summer.

The Resourceful Northwest.

The recent meeting of the American Mining Congress at Portland furnished an excellent opportunity to direct attention to the mineral resources of Oregon and the entire Northwest. Here is presented a great undeveloped mineral empire of tremendous possibilities. There is required railroads and other facilities, besides the investment of large capital, to make this vast section as productive as the other mineral districts, which are more fortunate, only so far that they receive their merited attention. The great possibilities in a mineral way of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Southern Alaska should be widely advertised, and the proper enterprise displayed to attract the necessary capital to exploit their vast undeveloped treasures. In connection with Oregon mining matters, it is interesting to note that the smelter at Sumpter has resumed, with the promise that a new era is dawning for this splendid producing section of Eastern Oregon.—Profit and Loss.
