A PLAIN WORD.

All that the LEADER said last week has been heartily endorsed by the right-thinking public of Cottage Grove and Lane County, as well as in other parts of the state, as is evidenced by numerous letters commending the stand taken by this paper. For the present no more will be said upon the subject. There is now opportunity for the Mayor and Common Council and the officials of the city to act. If they shall act they will have the cordial support of all good citizens, regardless of party. If they shall deem it unnecessary to simply instruct their officials to enforce the law, it will then be time to say more on the subject and say it harder and more directly.

The LEADER is dealing impartially, non-politically and firmly in the present instance. It neither fears revenge nor loss of patronage and will certainly and surely take up the matter again if the Council does not act in enforcing the law. If violation is continued it will then be time to take further measures. The LEADER feels confident that if the moral support of the Council is given to back up the officials of the law, there will be an exodus of gamblers from the city. Let the moral support of the people be assured for the Council. It is not a matter of politics in the present instance, it is a case of business necessity and civic pride. The wrong in every city is great enough without countenancing open violation of written laws and outraging the sense of decency and morality that prevails in every community. It can be shown and will be shown that power to correct the evils complained of lies with the governing board of the city. There is a remedy and application of it is all that is needed.

Cottage Grove people will have cause for thanksgiving if they are firm in their decision to rid the city of certain influences that are more detrimental than idle saw mills and a quiet season in the lumber

market. That lumber market is all right and there will be good times in Cottage Grove next year, but Cottage Grove must be what its name implies—a grove where cottages are homes and where homes are free from damning influences of loose morals and putrid social conditions. No matter what your line of business, get on record in favor of Cottage Grove—a clean Cottage Grove—a business Cottage Grove and against a "sporting" Cottage Grove.

Eugene Field was a book collector, and one of his favorite jokes, according to the Philadelphia Post, was to enter a bookshop where he was not known and ask in the solemnest manner for an expurgated edition of Mrs. Hemans' poems. One day in Milwaukee he was walking along the street with his friend, George Yenowine, when the latter halted in front of a bookshop and said: "Gene, the proprietor of this place is the most serious man I ever knew. He never saw a joke in his life. Wouldn't it be a good chance to try again for that expurgated Mrs. Hemans?" Without a word Field entered, asked for the proprietor, and then made the usual request. "That is a rather scarce book," came the reply. "Are you prepared to pay a fair price for it?" For just a second Field was taken aback. Then he said, "Certainly, certainly. I—I know it's rare." The man stepped to a case, took out a cheaply bound volume and handed it to Field, saying, "The price is \$5." EXERCISES FOR HEALTH.

A Little Shaking Up Before Breakfast Is a Good Thing.

For almost every person under fifty, and for a great many people over fifty, exercise is the nearest approach to a panacea for bodily ills that has yet been devised. Causing the body to move and stretch and push and pull makes the blood circulate, the liver do its work and the nerves pick up their dropped stitches. An excellent time to exercise is before breakfast. Neither man nor beast, as a rule, goes to sleep hungry. During sleep there is little waste of energy. On waking there is no immediate demand for replenishment of lost tissues. Furthermore, the long sleep has left the nerves and the digestive apparatus dull and leadened. To sit down to a heavy breakfast without fifteen or twenty minutes after getting out of bed means that the stomach receives food which it does not need and will not readily digest.

A little shaking up before breakfast arouses the vitality and consequently makes the appetite and digestion better. That means better work done during the day. If a man can get away from work in time to take additional exercise during the afternoon he will have a better appetite for the evening meal and more power to digest it. Sulphides Made to Amalgamate

"California is working out an interesting mill practice for sulphide ores," said A. R. Jamieson, of that state while at the Scott hotel yesterday. "The result of trying to amalgamate values in sulphides is bringing to a higher degree of perfection a plant for fine pulverization. Small stamps and high, slow drop are the two main features.

"Take the general milling practice of the California mother lode belt for first consideration. There the ore has been a gold quartz, friable and quite hard, and values are largely free and rather coarse, there being but a small percentage of iron pyrite in what was generally regarded an average near the surface. For handling this sort of ore, the mill as a rule has 700 to 1,600-pound stamps, drop of from four to six inches, at the rate of 90 to 105 times a minute; discharge four to six inches, intervals between drops .75 seconds, 40 to 50-mesh wire cloth screen and the stamp duty is from 2½ to 3 tons in 24 hours.

"For the heavier sulphide the mill finding vogue has stamps weighing from 500 to 600 pounds, with a drop of 13 to 18 inches, at the rate of 30 to 35 a minute, discharge 14 to 15 inches, and the mortars have a 50-mesh screen at the least and even finer. Slot screens are preferred for this size.

"This mill, you will notice, is calculated to reduce to a very fine pulp, as that discharge through a 50-mesh screen insures 80 per cent of the entire product leaving the battery being crushed to about 130-mesh. There is no doubt that a large part of the gold values in sulphides is free, and may be amalgamated if released from its gangue and given plenty of time on the plates. Both back and chuck block plates are generally used for these high discharge mortars, with the result that more than 50 per cent of total values are saved inside the mortar. With such fine crushing, when the mineral associated with the gold is sulphurous or pyritic, the loss from slimes must be heavy unless tailing plants are used. These are becoming more general all the time, especially since more improved methods are being used for agitating and extracting."
