ANNOUNCEMENT.

The Lane County Leader last week passed into the hands of several well known business men of the city.

Within a short time the plant will be merged into the Leader Publishing Company.

Messrs. Herbert Eakin, president of the First National Bank; Oliver Yeatch, a number of the school board, also of the city council; F. J. Hard, one of the leading and prominent mining men of Oregon, manager of the Vesuvius and other mining companies operating in Bohemia; Frank Rosenberg, auditor Pacific Timber Company and secretary of the Commercial Club of Cottage Grove; will be the incorporators.

It will be the aim of the Leader to fully represent the interests of Cottage Grove and the Western Coast.

The series of prizes offered by the Commercial Club for the best articles on Lane County, Bohemia Mining District and Cottage Grove, should be completed for by all who have the interest of this section in mind. The direct benefit to be gained from distribution of this sort of literature cannot be too strongly stated. The articles will be published in the local newspapers and will be sent by the Commercial Club in circular form to all parts of the country. The first series of three prizes will be for school children only—\$3, \$2 and \$1—on the subject of Cottage Grove alone. The eighteen other prizes will be open to all who desire to try their hand at writing on the three subjects mentioned—Lane County, Bohemia Mining District, and Cottage Grove. Prizes in each of the three series will be \$10, \$5, \$4, \$3, \$2 and \$1. In writing you have an opportunity to get a reward and to help your town and county at the same time. It is not a difficult thing to do. Write as if you were writing a letter to a good friend elsewhere.

The Portland Ministerial Union is opposing the opening of the Lewis & Clark Exposition on Sunday's. If the members of this organization, as strangers, had tried to pass a Sunday in Portland, without friends or acquaintances, and with nothing open to them but saloons and kindred places of business, they might better appreciate the opening of such beautiful views which will be opened to them by the fair.

The laying off of a crew of 250 men who have been working for the Southern Pacific Railroad Company in the Cow Creek canyon, because they refused to accept fewer hours and incidentally, a reduction of 35c a day in wages is only another evidence of the company's care for the "little things." Of course we will get a reduction of 50c on a round trip to Portland now.

The Commercial Club has added a bear to its club-room adornment. It is a large specimen of the black bear family and was for years a denizen of the woods about Cottage Grove. The commercial world has many bears, but none are likely to be so docile as that in the rooms of the Club.

A good many people still have faith in the hop business. The latest in this line is an addition of 70 acres, making 130 acres in all to a Southern Oregon yard.

Suit to Recover Commission.

In a suit before Justice J. W. Vaughn Tuesday to recover commission on a land sale in which H. T. Gow was plaintiff and George Drake and Welcome Hubble were defendants, the jury disagreed and were discharged.

Another jury was empaneled Wednesday and the case was closed late in the evening by a verdict for the plaintiff, for the full amount of the sum sued for, \$100, and costs and disbursements.

The plaintiff had entered into a contract with the defendant, to bring them a party with a timber claim who would be willing to trade same for Cottage Grove property, and the commission for the performance of which was to be the \$100 sued for.

The defendants contended that the timber claim did not scale 7,000,000 feet as required on their part, and refused to pay the \$200 "to boot" or the plaintiff's commission.

They afterwards made a deal with the party secured by Mr. Gow, and refused his commission on the grounds of non-fulfillment of contract. Attorneys Medley & Johnson appeared for the plaintiff, and Knox & King for the defendants.
