Bohemia News.

Bohemia, Dec. 3.—John Peterson, owner of the Golden Star group, has accepted a position as blacksmith with the Oregon Securities Company at Orseco.

An injunction was recently obtained against the Iowa Gold Mining Co. and D. J. Gover mgr., by O. H. Taplin, Alex. Lundberg, Chas. Atkinson, A. W. Ziniker, Reub Thorn and John Anderson. The injunction enjoins the defendants to cease mining, trespassing or taking away ores from the King David claim, formerly known as the Iowa.

The plaintiffs allege that the assessment work on the King David was not performed for the year 1903, hence they located the ground last spring. When the Iowa Gold Mining Co. represented by D. J. Gover commenced work on the claim this fall, the plaintiffs obtained an injunction from the Supreme Court, which was served lately. The case has caused a good deal of comment in the camp and the outcome will be watched with great interest.

At the Oregon-Colorado the contractors are pushing the work steadily with a double shift and making fine progress.

D. J. Gover, with a force of men, is at present doing development work on some claims near Horseheaven Creek.

Mr. Freeing finished the season's work on his group of claims on the north side of Elephant Mountain last week. He expresses himself gratified with the results.

At the Riverside, the contractors have built a flume 600 feet long, an air-pipe 1000 feet long running from the blower to the tunnel and are now installing a new Pelton water wheel and blower which will furnish air for the long tunnel. All their supplies for the winter are in and they will work a double shift until the big contract is finished. The ore body is at present a good deal wider than the face of the drift, and from all indications, the Riverside will make a great mine.

The Bohemia Mine Owner's Association will hold its last regular meeting for this year the second Monday in December. Though only a little more than a year old, it has already a large membership and its influence has been noteworthy in several measures that benefit Bohemia and the mining industry of Oregon.

A. W. Ziniker has finished the season's work on the Mayflower Mining Co's claims and is now developing the Mineral King group of which he is the owner.
