MINING M. N. DESIRE IT.

Commenting on the Register's reference to the movement inaugurated with the territory and advocated at Cottage Grove through the Commercial Club of that place for annexation of that portion of Bohemia district lying in Douglas County, to Lane, the Roseburg Plaindealer says:

"When the wagon road up the North Umpqua river, which at present terminates at a point a few miles southwest of Bohemia mines, is completed, which it will be at no distant date, Roseburg will be a more convenient and nearer county-seat point for the Bohemia miners than is Eugene at the present time.

"Simply from the fact that Douglas county laid down her hands and quietly submitted to Lane county gobbling up a six mile strip of the Douglas coast territory two years ago, our northern neighbor has developed greater ambitions and higher aspirations in the land grabbing business, and has become greedy for all of the tax income and other remuneration from the valuable natural resources which are being developed on her borders. If successful in annexing Bohemia mining district, we presume Lane's next move will be to annex that portion of the Blue River mines located in Linn county and the fine timber belt on the south slope of the Calapoopia and the North Umpqua mountains in Douglas county. It is time a halt was called for all time in Lane county's land grabbing schemes."

Our esteemed contemporary takes a wrong view entirely of this question. In both cases it refers to the request for annexation of Douglas county territory to Lane has come from the people themselves who reside within the territory seeking admission to Lane. Just how the Plaindealer can, consistently call this a Lane county land grabbing

scheme, we are at a loss to understand. Those Bohemia miners are consulting their own interests in making request to be taken into this country and the matter is entitled to proper consideration by the legislature. What ever facilitates the business of the people engaged in various enterprises aids that much in a more rapid progress of the country.

Lane county is not disposed to sit back on its dignity and say to the Bohemia miners of Douglas, "we will not admit you to Lane, however you may desire it for convenience in your mining business, because Douglas county objects."

Dr. A. W. Patterson Dies

EUGENE, Or., Dec. 21.—Dr. A. W. Patterson, a prominent early-day physician and educator, died at his home in this city yesterday afternoon at the age of 90. Dr. Patterson was born near Freeport, Pa., in 1814. He was educated at the Western University, Pittsburg, and graduated from the Pennsylvania College of Medicine in 1841. Coming to Oregon in 1852, he located on a donation land claim near Eugene. He began the practice of his profession soon afterward, also took surveying contracts in Oregon and Washington. As surveyor, he laid out the original town of Eugene in 1854. He was elected to the Territorial Legislature in 1854, served in the Rogue River Indian War in 1855-56 as First Lieutenant, and as surgeon in the medical department.

Dr. Patterson was chief clerk in the Surveyor-General's office, then located in Eugene, from 1858 to 1863 when he resumed the practice of medicine. He was elected State Senator on the Democratic ticket in 1870, and was largely instrumental in securing the State University for Eugene. In 1874 he compiled a series of school books, several of them being used in the public schools all over the Coast for a number of years. In 1882 he was elected School Superintendent of Lane county, and served in that capacity three terms.

Death of Mrs. Sarah J. Pitcher.

Mrs. Sarah J. Pitcher, an old and respected resident, died Tuesday morning, December 20, 1904, in Cottage Grove, at the home of her son, Green B. Pitcher, of pneumonia, at the age of 65 years.

The funeral was held Wednesday at 2 p. m., from the Methodist Church and was conducted by Rev. F. E. Billington, pastor of the Christian Church. The interment was in the Old Fellows Cemetery.

Mrs. Pitcher was a member of the Rebekah and Eastern Star lodges. The ceremonies at the church were under the auspices of the former order, while the latter performed the rites of the Star at the grave.

Mrs. Pitcher was born in Indiana on September 5, 1839. Her maiden name was Simmons. With her father's family she moved to Kansas while young, and afterward was united in marriage to Wm. Pitcher. With her husband she came across the plains to Oregon in 1874 and settled in Yamhill county, where they resided for eight years. After a change to Jackson county for one year they came to Cottage Grove where they have since resided. Mr. Pitcher died in 1880.

Seven children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Pitcher, four of whom are living, namely: Green B. and Alpha, of Cottage Grove, John, now in Idaho and Carey, now in Eastern Oregon.

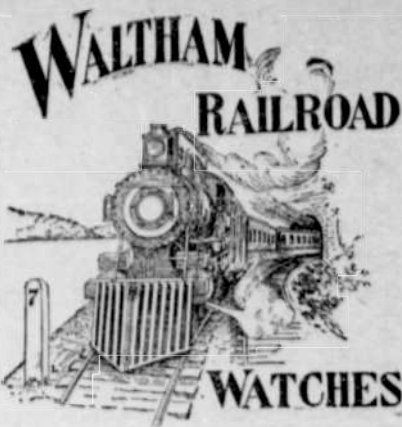
