Tax Levy.

The county commissioners' court at its session yesterday levied a 23-mill tax for the 1904 assessment, divided as follows:

There is an increase of one mill over last year's levy, which was 22. For last year the total assessment was \$8,322,500, which at 22 mills raised a revenue of \$183,095. This year the assessment is \$9,298,690, which, at 23 mills, will yield a revenue of \$213,869,870, or \$30,774 more than last year. Of this amount, however, \$20,457.77 goes toward paying off the county debt which is covered under the 2.2 mill levy, leaving the levy 1.2 mills less for general purposes than it was last year, but raising \$10,000 more revenue through increased assessment. The amount the state will receive will be \$53,002.53.—Eugene Register.

Work of the Legislature.

Hon. I. H. Bingham returned on Friday from his first weeks work in the legislature at Salem as that body has adjourned until Monday, at which time the committees will be announced. Mr. Bingham went right at his work and introduced four bills namely:

H. B. 84, by Bingham—Fixing travelling expenses of School Superintendent of Lane County.

H. B. 85, by Bingham—Fixing southern boundary of Lane County.

H. B. 86, by Bingham—For an additional Judge in Second Judicial District.

H. B. 87, by Bingham—To amend act authorizing bonds for streets and sewers in incorporated towns.

Claim Allowed.

Thos. Gill of the Eagle Book store, who lost his leg last winter, was a member in good standing in the K. O. T. M. order in this city and carried \$2000 insurance. Application to the Grand Lodge was made by Deputy J. W. Nokes for some relief for Mr. Gill.

Crystal Consolidated.

Elmer Doolittle came down from the Crystal Consolidated Company's property Friday and brought some very fine large pieces of the ore recently uncovered in the upper tunnel. The ore is partly oxidized and has the appearance of being a good milling and concentrating ore. The vein is at present about six feet in width.

Essay on Cottage Grove by Jean Darwood.

Cottage Grove is situated in the valley of the Coast Fork of the Willamette river. Its population is about 2200. It has two large school buildings, one on each side of the river.

The one on the east side of the river has nine rooms and the one on the west side has eight rooms.

Cottage Grove is growing very rapidly. It has four churches, the Christian, the Methodist, the Presbyterian, and the Catholic. It has many large stores and a new bank building.

There is a good flour mill and a saw mill in town. There are four or five hotels and a number of boarding houses.

There is a good walk all the way to the cemetery which is about a mile from the center of Cottage Grove.

The hills around Cottage Grove yield pine, fir, cedar and a few hemlock trees. In the valley are quite a number of oak trees and on the small hills are laurel trees. There are many saw mills on the hills near Cottage Grove, and on these hills are many rhododendron bushes on which grow very pretty pink flowers.

Cottage Grove is about thirty-five miles from the Bohemia gold mines. There is a railroad up for about eighteen or twenty miles from Cottage Grove. Black Butte, a large quick-silver mine, is about eighteen miles from the city.

The climate of Cottage Grove is very pleasant. The temperature hardly ever goes above one hundred and five in the summer and there is never more than a foot of snow in the coldest part of the winter.

It rains a good deal in the winter but it isn't the cold, driving rain that we get in the eastern states. Whenever it begins to rain it gets warmer and the rain generally comes straight down, but it comes so softly you hardly know it is raining at all.

There are many prune orchards around Cottage Grove, and fine peaches have been raised near there that measure nine inches.

It is a great rest for any one who has come from one of the cold states

to be able to see green grass and green trees any time in the year.

Cottage Grove is about twenty miles from the city of Eugene where the state university is.

The hills around Cottage Grove have good pasturage for goats and many are raised here.

They are mostly of the Angora breed.

When the farmers want the brush cleared off their land all they have to do is to let the goats in there and they clean it off as slick as a man could.

There are two good stations at Cottage Grove, there are also three or four reservoirs on the hills close to the city.

It seems queer to the folks who have used coal all their lives to come here and see the folks burning wood.

Some of the Oregonian children have never seen coal.

There are two trees on the reservoir hill nearest town which take five children, about ten years old, to reach around.

There are many trees in the woods that measure four or five feet at the base.

Centennial Notes.

Persia's exhibit at the Lewis and Clark Centennial will be worth \$200,000.

Great Britain will occupy 3,600 square feet of exhibit space at the Lewis and Clark Centennial.

Vermont's building at the Lewis and Clark Centennial will be a reproduction of the old Constitution House of 1777.

Hungary will have an exhibit at the Lewis and Clark Centennial worth \$30,000. The exhibit will occupy 2,000 square feet of space.

Costa Rica will make a fine display of coffee, hemp, cocoa and other products at the Western World's Fair. The display is valued at \$20,000.

Egypt and Morocco will make a combined African display at the Lewis and Clark Centennial. The exhibit will cover 1,500 square feet and its value will be \$225,000.

An interesting attraction for women at the Lewis and Clark Exposition will be the display of the latest frocks from Paris in the French section of the Manufactures building.

The hatching of chickens will be shown to the general public at the Lewis and Clark Exposition. All exhibitors of incubators will be required to make their displays operative, and at stated hours the crowds will be invited to come and see the chickens break their shells.

The piling and flooring work on the Trail and Bridge of Nations at the Lewis and Clark Centennial is now completed, and the Government Peninsula can now be reached by this route. The bridge spans 2,000 feet of water and is the longest bridge ever erected at an Exposition.
