Harvesting Pointoes.

Most of the fields of early potatoes will be ripe enough to dig this month unless they were planted very late, says American Cultivator. It does not do them any good to remain in the ground after the tops have died down. Dig them and let them lie on the ground until dry, but not long enough get sunburned. Then pick them up and put in a cool, dry place, not pilling B calin, B retiring, B ne'er led astray, to rot unless the disease is very bad among them before they are dug. Potatoes do not need to be handled quite as carefully as eggs or apples, yet they are not henefited any by being roughly handled when first dug

Profitable Age For Butchering. The flesh of very young animals frequently lacks flavor and is watery. An old animal, properly fattened and ladies' cloaks and shirt waists at in good health, would be preferable to low prices. a young one in poor condition. The best meat will be obtained from

cattle from thirty to forty months old. A calf should not be used for veal under six weeks of age, is best about ten weeks old and raised on the cow. Hogs may be used at any age after six weeks, but the most profitable age is eight to twelve months.

Sheep may be used from two to three months old. They will be at their best before two years old, usually at eight to twelve months.


