Mrs. J. D. Petrie, mother of Dr. H. H. Petrie, of this city, died at the family home at Lorane last Thursday evening, February 3, 1905, aged 78 years. Her death was caused by a complication of stomach troubles and old age. The funeral was held on Sunday afternoon from the residence, conducted by Captain O'Brien, under the auspices of St. Lawrence Grange. Interment was made in the Grange cemetery at Lorane.
