The city election on last Monday marks a distinct epoch in the history of Cottage Grove. While the people were quiet on the surface, there was a very perceptible under-current that told the drift of public sentiment on the management of city finances and public works. The old idea that it is "none of the peoples business" what is done or how it is done, is at last exploded. The people desire to be heard upon questions of public interest. They want to know what becomes of the public funds; they expect electric light franchises to be thoroughly investigated and competition invited before jumping pell-mell onto the very first proposition that is submitted. The one-sided vote on last Monday for mayor was not so much a test of personal popularity as it was a rebuke to the last city administration, for its extravagance, and its failure to render a showing up of the financial condition of the city as required by law, and its policy in general. The newly elected officers enter upon their duties, knowing that the eyes of the people are upon them and we believe that they will not fall into any of the same errors or make the same mistakes that have made the old administration so unpopular.

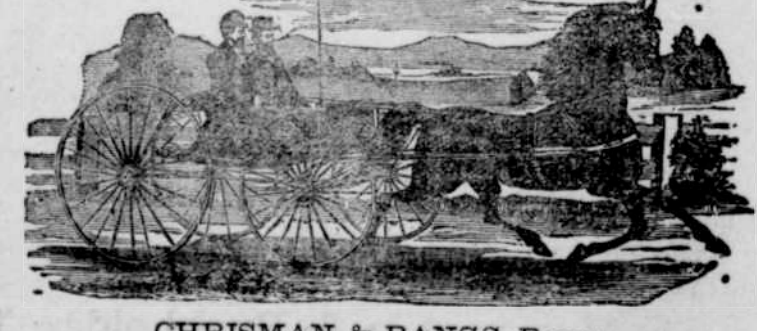
