His faithful portrayal of the typical southerner in trying ordeals showed the mantle of the heavy part in the play had not fallen upon the wrong shoulders. Miss Sina Orrell, formerly of this place, in no wise disappointed her hearers in her debut as Maude Bradley, the Southern Belle. Miss Orrell is seldom surpassed by amateurs on the stage and indeed many so called professionals fall far short of her in ability and appearance before foot-lights. Her lines were rendered without a fault, save where womanly modesty of amateurs made it more difficult for her to act the part of a passionate lover, than for professionals. And this cannot be accounted to her as a fault but rather a credit. We have not space to comment upon the entire cast further than to say the others did fairly well with the exception of Sockery Schneidlebeck and he did even better, "which reminds us of what the beautiful poet once wrote when he said "If at first you don't succeed, try it some more a couple of times."
