The effort is a very creditable one, as far as it goes, but the committee evidently got tired after devoting a little over four of the eight pages to Eugene and the Blue River Mines and quit the job before they had fairly commenced. This wonderful effort was printed by the Eugene Register and was intended for general distribution, no doubt, by one or two real estate dealers in Eugene. But it is not worth while for the people in the southern or western part of the county to fool with it, for the space devoted to their sections of the county, consists in being included in the general summary of taxable valuations at the present time. There are some valuable figures given in the pamphlet such as the elevation of the county, the number and kind of seasons, our distance from Portland, as measured from Eugene etc. We presume that the writers were laboring under the erroneous impression that the county was divided some years ago and that its boundaries were reduced to that of Eugene, Springfield and the Blue River Mines.

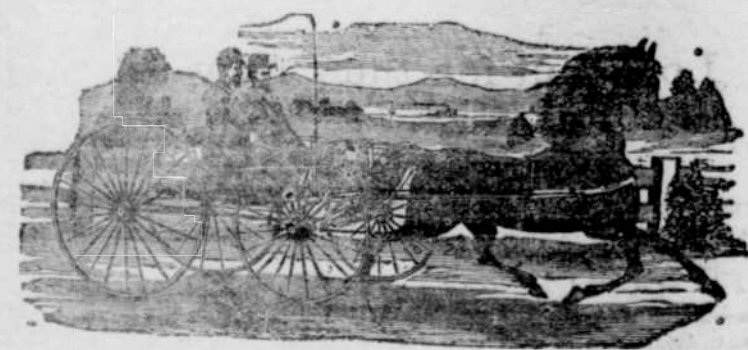
