LONG LIVE THE MINER.

It is estimated that for every man employed in mining, four are necessary to take care of his products and two to supply his wants. Whatever helps the miner helps everybody. He produces nothing that he himself can consume but he depends upon someone else for every thing that he does use or consume. The farmer, the mechanic, the manufacturer are like him in that they produce, but they are not like him, in that they consume their own products first, and only the surplus goes to others. The miner consumes nothing of his own product and his every want must be supplied by others. He competes with no one; his success is not due to the failure of competitors. He has no competitor with which he must reckon or whom he must fight. He buys from all and he sells to all. If success is his, others prosper with him and do not go down because of his success.

The miner creates a home market but cannot glut it. When he has money to spend, every man in contact with him gets some of it. Long live the miner and all who help him in anyway. There is but one class of men who cannot truthfully and heartily join in with this cry and indeed they owe all their ill-gotten gains to him. That class is the mining shark or speculator, his object is not to develop and work a mine and make it a producer but to gamble in bargains. It is as often his desire that mines may prove failures as that they

may prove successes. He buys and bonds cheap and expects to sell dear. He tries to rope in the unwary, fleece them and then hunt for newer fields. The miner and developer is a blessing to a community, the speculator, a curse. The world takes off its hat to the former, it despises the latter
