The fact that it is two years behind in its work, does not seem to interfere with the usual four month's vacation of the Supreme Court.

General Shafter has retired. Criticized though his management may have been, it was indisputably and overwhelming success. He captured Santiago and more men than he had in his entire army.

Late census returns show that there are six American millionaires who have become naturalized Britishers. It pleases them and it pleases the United States; whether it pleases the British is another thing.

Director Roberts of the mint has won a reputation for clean accurate work that would certainly justify the President in selecting him for the post vacated by controller Dawes. Besides, he is a good news paper man.

The official report of ship building in the United States in the fiscal year 1900-01 shows an aggregate of over 400,000 tons, the largest for 46 years. Yet now is the time selected to clamor for a subsidy bill.

It is rather a fine point to say that General Smith opposes Quay and the Philadelphia gang as a Pennsylvanian and not as a member of the administration. However, if the President wishes to dodge responsibility in the matter, let him do so.

Secretary Wilson, says that the sugar trust is about to be smashed by the cultivation of beet sugar in this country. Somebody should tell the good old man that the sugar trusts own or control nine-tenths of the beet sugar factories in the United States.

Porto Rico Will come within the tariff laws of the United States on July 25. Senator Aldrich tried to get the President to shut her out for several months longer on pretext of testing her revenue abilities, but William was afraid to make the play.

The state normal school at Drain is announced to open on Monday, September 9th. The faculty has been increased and strengthened. Additions have been made to the course—piano, organ and vocal music, drawing etc. Teachers review classes will be organized to aid young teachers in securing better grades and advanced certificates. The course covers work required for state certificate and life diploma. Special advantages are offered high school graduates. The new catalogue is worth reading and will be mailed to all writing the President at Drain asking for it.

SPEED LIMIT IN YACHTS.
It begins to look as if the craft of yacht building has, for the time being, at least, reached a point where further improvement in the matter of speed is not attainable.

There is a serious doubt in the minds of American experts as to the superiority of the new cup defender, Constitution, over the old, Columbia. There is a serious doubt in the minds of British experts as to the superiority of the cup challenger, Shamrock II, over the old Shamrock I.

In the English trial races off Rothesay the new cup challenger has not by any manner of means outtailed the old. Unhappy accidents to the former have prevented the fullest demonstration of the merits of the two yachts. And remarkable to relate, exactly the same conditions prevail on this side as affecting a judgement on the respective qualities of the new and old cup defenders. The trial races off Newport have been anything but satisfactory.

For this very reason, however the contest for the American's Cup this year will be possessed of a peculiar interest. Preceding races have shown a steady improvement in both American and British yachts. There are grounds for the belief that the two nations have about reached the limit of speed in yachts temporarily at any rate. Only the actual American's Cup races of 1901 can definitely settle this point. And the settlement of such a point cannot but attract an exceptional international attention.

"Bonds, bonds, where are the bonds?" is a sort of game, something like "Thimble, thimble" etc that numerous persons are engaged in playing. The bonds in the case are those alleged to have been issued by agents of the republic of Cuba, and the proceeds to have been expended in fighting Spain. Where those bonds are and how many of them are out is a question that is the key to the game and not likely to be fully answered until the holders of them make a demand on the Cuban government, soon to be established. One man who probably knows about all that is to be known about those bonds, and may be has a big block of them himself, was in Washington this week, conferring with Secretary Root and Mr McKinley. That was Gen Meximo Gomez, who commanded what the Cubans were pleased to call an army when the Americans took possession of Cuba, and became straight from the man who knows even more about the bonds than he does, because all that were sold had to pass through his hands. That man is Tomaso Estrada Palma, who was at the head of the Cuban junta in New York, where he still makes his home. General Gomez talks a lot of rot about gratitude bringing him to Washington, but some very clear signs indicate that his real object is to secure administration influence for a Cuban Presidential candidate who can be depended upon not to turn the cold shoulder Gomez and his friends who have Cuban bonds. But why he didn't fix it up with Gen Wood, in Havana, without bringing the matter to Washington is a little puzzling, although the fact that Gen Wood's private secretary is with Gomez indicates that the visit to Washington was approved by Wood.

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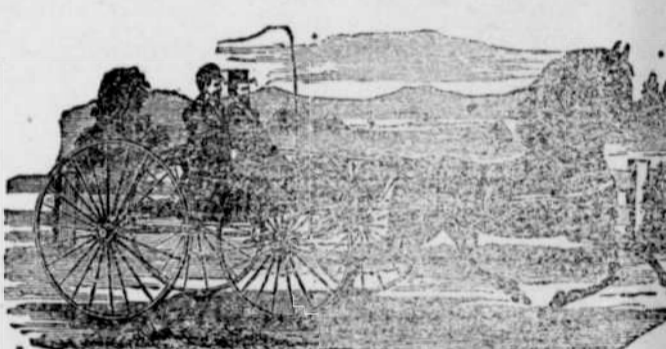
