DIED.

HAWLEY.—Tuesday, Aug. 6, at 1 p. m., at his home near Creswell, Mr. Ira D. Hawley, aged 85 years.

Mr. Hawley was born in Floyd, Oneida Co., New York, May 13, 1816. When a young man he emigrated to Illinois where he was married to Miss Elvira Riley in 1841. In the spring of '49 he struck out for the great California gold fields where he remained about two years. Not meeting, however, with the success he desired, he returned to his old home in the east in 1851, by water around Cape Horn. In the summer of 1852 he again started west, this time by ox team and headed for Oregon. On this trip was consumed six months so that he did not arrive in the Willamette valley until some time in December. In January following he selected for his future home the donation land claim at Divide where he has continued to reside until the past few years.

Mr. Hawley was one of Lane County's most well known and highly respected pioneer citizens, having resided at or near Cottage Grove, Eugene or Creswell for the past 45 years or more. He came to Oregon in 1853 and first located at his old home place, near Divide. In the early fifties he established a stage station at that place on the line of the old Oregon and California wagon road which he conducted for about twenty years. Mr. Hawley was one of those sturdy and thrifty pioneers of early days, whose conservative business methods soon earned him a competence as well as the esteem of his neighbors and he has been considered one of the most substantial and solid farmers of south Lane county.

For the past ten years he has lived more or less at Eugene and Creswell and has been in very feeble health. Old age finally led him across the river and in memory alone will be live among his early pioneer neighbors and the large circle of acquaintances. He leaves five sons, Geo. M., Wm. B., James H., and Robt. D., all of this county and a son in Boise, Idaho, who are all well to do and prominent citizens of their respective localities, to mourn his loss. He was buried near his old home at Divide, Wednesday afternoon.
