Another Pioneer Gone.

O. F. Knox, one of Cottage Grove's Most Substantial Citizens is Dead.

Laid to Rest in Masonic Cemetery, Monday Afternoon.

Once again were the people of this entire community saddened by the news received, Sunday morning, of the death of another highly respected and esteemed pioneer citizen of Cottage Grove.

Mr. Oscar F. Knox, who, from the earliest days of Cottage Grove's existence, has been closely identified with its progress and upbuilding, passed peacefully away at his new home in Eugene, at 10 a. m., Sunday, Aug. 11, after an illness of some two weeks from Pleuro-pneumonia. He was surrounded by his cherished, grief-stricken family during his last hours with the exception of his eldest daughter, Mamie, of Cheney, Wash., and who was hastening to his bedside, and arrived only a few hours after his death.

Monday afternoon the heart-broken family arrived here with the corpse, and accompanied by a large number of friends and relatives proceeded to the cemetery, where, after a brief burial service, at the grave the remains were laid away to rest by the side of his father, the late S. B. Knox, and his second daughter, Lottie, who preceded him to the other shore.

Rev. F. E. Billington, pastor of the Christian church, of which Mr. Knox was a consistent and devoted member, conducted the services in the presence of the largest concourse of people perhaps ever gathered at the burial of an esteemed citizen, in this community. The combined choirs of the various churches joined in the solemn services and sang, as well as their emotions would permit, some of the beautiful hymns. Mr. Knox, himself had taught them to sing, years ago. The ladies of the W. C. T. U. fittingly decorated the newly made grave with a profusion of beautiful flowers in attesting their respect and esteem for one whose sympathy and assistance were ever ready to aid the cause of temperance in which he was a firm, active and earnest believer.

Mr. Knox was born in Schuyler county, Mo., June 22, 1815 and was therefore aged 56 years, 1 month, and 20 days. At the age of about 10 years he crossed the plains with his parents, arriving in the Willamette valley in the fall '53. The following spring his father settled near this place which has been his home until the last year when he moved to Eugene for better school facilities and where he had erected a handsome new residence. This new home was only completed the day before his death.

Mr. Knox's earlier education was obtained in the common schools near Cottage Grove. Later he attended Willamette University and Monmouth College, graduating from the latter institution in 1871. Ever a friend of education, and especially active in the support of the public school system, he faithfully served in the capacity of school director in this city for 16 years, and to his efforts, in a large degree, our public school owes its present efficiency.

In 1873 Mr. Knox was married to Sarah Churchill, of Polk county, and in this union they were blessed with six children, Mamie, Roy, Lottie, Duke, Lizzie and Frank, all of whom are living, except Lottie, and are highly esteemed young people.

For a number of years he served as Mayor of this city and had been engaged in active business pursuits in this city and as a mark of respect for his business integrity and personal worth, all our principal business houses were closed during the funeral services. Strictly honest in business affairs, unquestionably upright in character, a kind and considerate neighbor and a Christian gentleman, Mr. Knox will ever live in the memory of his acquaintances as a clean, moral and respected citizen. Besides a loving wife and family he leaves two brothers, Roscoe and Jerome, and six sisters, Mesdames H. C. and S. E. Veatch, J. A. and J. H. McFarland, of this place, John Morris of Creswell and R. G. Carlson of Pleasant Hill to mourn his death.
