CONTRACT LET.—The city council has let the contract for excavating and building the new reservoir to C H Wallace and Geo Comer. Mr Comer does the excavating and laying of the feed pipes and the contract price for the work is \$137.00. Mr Wallace does the masonry, furnishes the brick and cement and for this part of the work receives \$219.00. The reservoir is to be 6 ft wide at each end, 9 ft in the center, 16 ft long and 6 ft deep with 9 inch walls of solid brick. There will be two lines of 4 and 6 in feed pipes 610 ft and 800 ft in length. A suitable house will be built over the reservoir and the water which is unsurpassed by any in the State will be protected from filth and surface water making the system as nearly perfect as is possible. Contractor Lea says the ditching for the pipe line from the reservoir to the city is nearing completion and will be finished by the last of this week or the first of next. The invoice and shipping receipts for the pipe have arrived and the pipe is daily expected when it arrives the laying of the pipe will commence at once and proceed as rapidly as possible until completion.
