**HOP PICKING.**—The Knox hop yard was a scene of bustling activity, Wednesday morning, when scores of pickers commenced stripping the vines. The hops are of good quality and a fine yield is expected. Picking will last 10 or 12 days.

**CONTRACT SECURED.**—Wm George has secured the contract of driving a 100 foot tunnel on the Golden Slipper Mining Claim at Bohemia, and will commence work the first of next week. The contract price is \$6.00 per foot which is considered a fair price as the ground is good to work.

**NEW BRICK.**—Mr Frank Wheeler has about closed the deal with C H Wallace and sons to erect a two story brick on the corner opposite Sherwood's Hotel. The building will be a handsome structure when completed and will add greatly to the appearance of Main Street.

**A FINE SHOWING.**—Rev C A Woolley, and wife returned from a month's stay at Bohemia, Tuesday, where he has been looking after the interests of the Golconda Mining Company. Rev Woolley reports the uncovering of one of the companies ledges and a fine showing is the result, it being fully 10 ft in width from which free gold may be panned with ease in any part of the vein. Considerable work has been done by the company already this season and work will be continued probably till snow lies if not later.

Rev J F Tout, of Ashland, delivered an address at the Christian Church Tuesday, evening in the interests of the Anti-Saloon League. Mr Tout is the State Sept of this work in Oregon and a better selection for the work in hand would be hard to find. To his untiring efforts in great degree, the city of Ashland owes its uniqueness in being a "dry" town to day. The Reverend gentleman says it is all about a "dry" town being necessarily a dead one and that Ashland is proving it so by a general increase of all other kinds of business. He says a "dry" town not only raises less grass in its streets than does a "wet" one but it also quits raising "hell" while the "wet" one is assured a big crop.

**GOOD PROSPECTS.**—F J Hard, of Portland and who has been with his family rustiating and also looking after his mining interests in Bohemia for the past month or so, returned home a few days ago, very well pleased with his trip. Mr Hard says the Oregon-Colorado Mining Co has now completed something over 700 feet of tunneling and the latest discoveries prove the property to be a good one to say the least. A contract has been let for driving an additional 500 ft of tunnel at a still lower level which will tap a large body of ore at a depth of nearly 1,000 ft. The rock bears gold, silver and copper, in base and will probably have to be treated by smelting. Mr Hard says that the croppings indicate that the ledge is a large one, probably 10 to 12 ft wide and is easily traceable for nearly a mile. The property is well situated for development work and it is hoped the company will see their way clear to make a paying proposition out of this promising mine.
