Residence Burned.

The Beautiful Home of James McFarland Destroyed by fire.

Only household effects in the lower story were saved from the flames.

Tuesday afternoon about 1 o'clock a fire alarm was turned in and in a few moments the fire departments, with hose carts were on the way to the residence of Jas H McFarland on the north-western outskirts of town which by this time was seen to be enveloped in smoke, before reaching the scene it was found the reservoir on the west side of town was empty and all hope of saving the elegant residence was abandoned. The hose carts and firemen were of no avail for total lack of water. The furniture and cooking utensils were saved but owing to the rapidly spreading flames above, nothing could be got out of the upper story and soon the helpless throng, now gathered at the scene, could do nothing but stand away from the heat and regret the inadequate water supply of the city. Heroic efforts were made to save the new woodshed, smoke house and milk house but without avail, the heat being too intense. Firemen C H Burkholder, Frank McFarland and Frank Phillips were overcome by heat and assistance was promptly rendered. Flying sparks and shingles soon set the surrounding grass afire but this was promptly whipped out before any great damage was done other than scorching the shrubbery and burning some of the yard fence.

There were no men at the house at the time the fire started and the women folks were unable to do anything to check the flames until they were beyond control. Mrs Rena Edwards and Miss Daisy Thomas and Mrs Eredricksen who were present and engaged in sewing did all they could but the fire caught somewhere near the kitchen and between the roof and ceiling and they could not get at the flames.

Mr and Mrs McFarland are visiting at Boise, Idaho, and the amount of insurance is not known at this writing though it is known a small policy was held in the Oregon Fire Relief Assn, of McMinnville. The loss is estimated at between \$2000 and \$2500. Indeed the latter sum could not replace it.

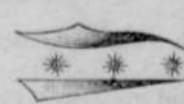
