Hops SHIPPED.—Duke Knox has had his hop crop hauled to town and shipped to the Friendly Warehouse, in Eugene. He will probably hold them there and pool with other growers for a higher price before selling.

A GOOD ONE.—Tuesday at the preliminary hearing in the justice court in this city in a case where the Townsend fellow was charged with "assault with deadly weapon," the venerable "squire" after hearing the evidence and arguments of the counsel, said: It is the judgment of this court that you (the prisoner) be confined in the county jail for a period of 90 days.

BOUND OVER.—Tuesday deputy prosecuting attorney Harris arrived here and after a short and exciting trial before Justice Vaughn George Townsend was bound over in the sum of \$250 to appear before the Circuit Court on a charge of assault with deadly weapon on the person of Nichols, a bartender. THE TICKETS WERE SILENT.—One of the most remarkable features of President McKinley's funeral was the stopping of all telegraphic communication in the United States for the period of five minutes. At the hour of 2:30 p.m. the time set for depositing the casket in its last resting place at Canton, every telegraph instrument in the land became silent and remained so for a period of five minutes. Not a tick was heard and the first time in the history of the telegraph every line and every instrument was dead.

COUGAR KILLED.—Monday Mr Schlee and Doc Pitcher while out deer hunting had the good fortune of bagging a fine cougar. They were on the side of the mountain near Ora Robinson's place when Mr Schlee spied his cougarship creeping along through an open glen and at a distance of about 200 yards he fired a couple of shots into the animal. The dogs were put on to its trail and soon had it up a tree when it was quickly dispatched. It measured about 8 feet and its hide was exhibited at Mr Schlee's Grocery Store, Tuesday, attracting considerable attention.
