

High School Defeats C. M. A's

Last Saturday about 750 people gathered at the C. M. A. foot ball field to cheer our boys on to victory over the Eugene high school team, but all to no avail. It was an evident fact that the C. M. A. team stood no show as soon as the two teams took the field, for the high school boys looked like giants by the side of our men. The average weights of the teams were 134 pounds for the H. S.'s and 120 for the C. M. A.'s. Though our boys were unable to score they have no reason to be discouraged, for they play ball like demons, and we will venture the assertion that they can defeat any team in the county of equal weight. Griffin at full back was the star of the game. Time after time would he smash through Eugene's interference and bring down the man with the ball before his end man could get him, and only one time did he fail on tackling. His line bucking was wonderful. Bennett and Taylor as halves played splendid ball. Earl Hill played quarter and did to right. The line men did good work and held their men for the ball on downs several times. Francis and Dillard were Eugene stars. The following is the line-up:

THE GAME

At 3:15 Umpire Ford blew the whistle and the game was on. The C. M. A.'s kicked off 40 yards to Eugene's left guard, who carried the ball back ten yards before he was brought down. Line breaking and end runs took the ball back to the center of the field, where the C. M. A.'s gained the ball on downs. Eugene was then pushed back ten yards, where the ball again went to them, the C. M. A.'s failing to make yardage. Dillard and Gaby each made a five-yard gain around the ends, landing the ball in the center of the field again. Dillard made a sensational run of 40 yards, and was pulled down by Taylor in very pretty style. Here the ball went to the home team on down and back again to Eugene in the same manner, and after a few line bucks Crabtree went through the C. M. A.'s line for a touch-down. Kuykendall kicked a goal. Time 15 minutes.

C. M. A.'s kicked off 30 yards. The high school boys steadily pushed the ball back within a few yards of the C. M. A.'s goal, and by a forward pass the oval went over the line and Curran fell on it, counting two points for Eugene. C. M. A.'s were given 15 yards on forward pass and Hill made a drop kick of 25 yards. The H. S.'s were working hard for another touch-down and evidently got a little rattled, for after advancing the ball 20 yards an off-side play gave our boys 15 yards and the ball Griffin smashed through Eugene's line like a warhorse for ten yards, but just as he came down the whistle blew and the first half was ended. Score 8 to 0.

SECOND HALF

The visitors kicked off 30 yards and a line-up was made on the spot. Taylor made a pretty five-yard gain around the left end, and Griffin bucked the line for a couple more yards. Eugene got the ball on downs and just four and a half minutes from the time the ball was kicked off put it over the line. Kuykendall failed on goal. C. M. A.'s kicked off 30 yards. Eugene pushed the ball back to the center, where Gaby made an end run of 30 yards and Griffin made the star tackle of the game, bringing his men down like a thousand of brick. Dillard was laid out at this stage of the game and replaced by Johnson. A few minutes later the high schools made another touch-down. Kuykendall attempted a goal but failed. Time 7 minutes.

C. M. A.'s kicked off and again toward the end of the game their goal was threatened, but Griffin punted out of danger and the ball died on the 20 yard line in home territory.
