RAISING CALVES AN IMPORT- ANT INDUSTRY ON THE FARM.

To keep up the supply of stock
which should be constantly on the in-
crease in this country, large number
of calves must be raised. A
great many of these young animals
are now sold to the butchers and
this detracts largely from the sup-
ply that is needed to keep the num-
bers good on the farm. And in
some instances it is feared that the
best, or those that will bring the
most money, are disposed of in this
way. The farmer should make no
mistake in this matter and injure
the future prospects for a little pres-
ent gain. The best for the purpose
needed should be retained on the
farm. Particularly should this be
the case where dairying is the lead-
ing industry, and indeed the same
rule will apply where beef produc-
ing is followed, or both combined.
The best are none too good for the
purpose. But I wish to speak the
more particularly of the dairy. The
farmer as a general thing should
raise his own stock that is the heifers.
Of course he should get the best
males he can from the most approv-
ed families or breeds and then select
the most promising heifer calves
from the best cows. A considerable
proportion of our most enterprising
dairymen, those who are in a condi-
tion to do so, have their cows come
fresh in milk from September, or
during the four succeeding months.
This affords a good opportunity for
raising a fine lot of fall and winter
calves that if well cared for, will be-
come large thrifty animals which
another spring, as the pastures be-
come good, will be fully able to
care for themselves. The raising of
calves in this manner is becoming
quite an industry of itself where
winter dairying is practiced. It
comes at a time of year when work
can be readily performed and in
the best manner. To be the most
successful in this business there are
some necessary conditions. These
are comfortable quarters, where the
young animals can be kept dry and
warm. This is very important, as
they can hardly be expected to
thrive or do well in cold, dark, wet
pens. Plenty of bedding to keep
them dry is one of the requisites
and they should be fed regularly
with warm, sweet milk—it may be
skim milk after the first few weeks,
or days even—with neither too little
or too much at a time. Where
separators are used on the farm, or
cold, deep setting of milk practiced,
these conditions can be successfully
carried out. Where calves are thus
kept in a comfortable stable and fed
milk until the following spring, they
should become such animals the
owner may well be proud of.
But milk should not form the entire
ration. After a few weeks they will
commence to eat a little hay and it
should be fed to them regularly,
and of the best quality. If there is
a silo on the premises the ensilage
will be relished and help to make a
better ration. Not much grain need
be fed, as it is essential to develop
the milking qualities rather than
those of a beef tendency. A little
bran or oats will not come amiss.
The idea should be to keep them
healthy, thrifty and growing all
through the winter, the beginning of
just such animals as the farmer will
be delighted with a little time hence
when they should take their places
in his own dairy or go to make a
profitable addition to some other
herd.

Doings at the Capitol.

President Roosevelt is doing some
very hard thinking these days and
the results are by no means re-as-
suring. A month ago he had no
conception of the dilemma a man
who desired above all else to be
true to his country, his party and
own chances of a second term
would find in the White House.
He is, however, having these things
thrust upon him. He finds a grow-
ing demand in the west for a re-
duction of those schedules of the
tariff which are protecting the trusts
and this demand is being led by
such men at Babcock to whom
local issues and the demand of his
own constituents seem to be all im-
portant. On the other hand he
finds that he is almost powerless to
effect any relief from present con-
ditions. He is beginning to realize
that, after all, a president's
power is limited in many ways and
in many directions. The party
leaders have, in response to the
Presidents request, been coming to
Washington and most of them tell
him that it will be simply impossi-
ble to secure any legislation by the
coming Congress that does not
meet with the entire approval of
the trusts. They tell him that
while reciprocity is excellent as "a
talking point" it will not "go" with
the Senate. They tell him that he
must not try to effect any legisla-
tion which will prove of advantage
to Cuba because the party is pledged
to protect the sugar interests in
this country. On the other hand
he is too keen a judge of human
nature to minimize the danger of
permitting the coming, eminently
Republican Congress to pass into
history with a record of having in-
variably either legislation or failed
to legislate in accordance with the
desires of the vested interests.
Senator Aldrich of Rhode Island
"read the riot act" to the President
the subject of those reciprocity
treaties and Mr Roosevelt appreci-
ate that practically all hope of
their ratification must be abandoned.
He also spoke very plainly on the
subject of Cuba and pointed to the
party platforms of the last decade
as evidence that sugar interests
must be protected. Mr. Henry P
Oxnard has been in Washington
this week and has given notice that
any legislation inimical to the
sugar interests will be met with a
bitter fight. Mr R C Kerns, the
member of the Republican National
Committee from Missouri, called at
the White House and dwelt with
much stress upon the western de-
mand for tariff revision. The Pres-
ident has, it is said, requested Sec-
retary Wilson to go out west and
forestall criticism based on the
failure of the reciprocity treatise.
At all events Mr Wilson left for
Iowa yesterday and before going he
told me that he intended to explain
to the people of Iowa the situation
in regard to "the continued need of
protection" and "the true basis of
reciprocity." The President has
taken the bull by the horns and in-
structed Secretary Root to try and
get along without sending any
more troops to the Philippines to
take the place of the 10,000 men
whose terms of enlistment are about
expire. I understand the President
spoke pretty plainly about the re-
ports that had been given out as
to "pacification," etc., and also called
attention to the fact that the Samar
affair showed a sad lack of precau-
tion on the part of the officers.
