General Miles says the anti-cantain law has proved to be well adopted. Secretary Root and General Corbin say that it has proved to be ill adopted, all buttress their assertions by bewildering statistics. Which are we to believe?

The Schley Court, organized to destroy the reputation of the Sampson plan of battle and in demonstrating that had it not been for the Brooklyn striking out a new plan of her own, at least two and probably three of the Spanish ships would have escaped.

Buffalo lost four millions dollars on her fair, so far as cash is concerned, though possibly her citizens have gotten benefits to that valuation from it. The chances are however, that the country is getting tired of big fairs; they have certainly been overdone of late.

How differently they do things in England. Lord Roberts received \$500,000 for having failed to whip the Boers, while Admiral Schley will have to pay \$20,000 for having destroyed the Spanish fleet. The Bureau of Fabrication comes out on top, after all.

Forecasts of the action of Congress are all right to fill space in the newspapers, but about the only parts of them that are accurate are the figures as to the total amount of the appropriations. All the other schemes are only half baked so far, and there is a good deal of doubt whether they will ever proceed much further.

The greatest amount of railway building during the past year was in Arkansas and Georgia. Alabama with one-fourth the inhabitants of New York, has half as many miles of railroad. Arkansas has three times as much as Connecticut, and Georgia twice as much as Massachusetts. Who says the south is not booming?

Of course the real danger from such an act as Roosevelt's inviting Booker Washington to dinner, is that it may give social prestige to the negro, which will inevitably lead to miscegenation. Once that becomes common, the south will sink to the level of South America with its varying population of black and tan. The only safe way of resisting this, is to resist negro equality wholly and absolutely half way measures are of no use whatever.
