Cottage Grove should organize a board of trade at once. We have had numerous inquiries as to what was the matter with our board of trade. We are ashamed to tell them that there is not such a thing in the town. Our business men should by all means take an interest in this matter and see that a board is organized at once.

According to our exchanges throughout the state there is beginning to be considerable interest manifested not only in state but in county politics. Candidates for the several local offices to be filled are feeling the public pulse and gradually either openly announcing themselves or placing their fate in the hands of their friends. In only a few rare instances is mention made of candidates for the legislature.

No other town in the state or on the Pacific coast can offer better inducements to capital to invest than Cottage Grove. It has never had a boom and never wants one. Its growth is steady and will continue to be so. Its numerous resources insure that fact. Situated as it is, Cottage Grove is the center of what will be, before many years the richest country in the state.

It is surrounded by a good farming country back of which lie thousands of acres of the finest timber in the world and last but not least the great Bohemia and Blackbutte mines, with their hidden treasures of gold, silver, copper, lead and quicksilver. Where will you find another town with such resources surrounding it?

These mines are beginning to attract the attention of eastern capital, while timber cruisers from the east with plenty of money behind them, are continually scouring the mountains adjacent our thriving little city. The proposed railroad into the Bohemia mining district from Cottage Grove will connect the district with the outside world and will also tap one of the finest timber belts on the Pacific coast. With the terminus of this road at Cottage Grove we become central point. Supplies for the mines, and numerous lumbering camps that are sure to be in operation in the near future will all be shipped from this point.

With the development of these resources Cottage Grove in five years from today will be a city of five times its present size. Her people are beginning to realize that fact and are getting a move on them in the right way. More permanent improvements are now being contemplated for the early spring than ever before. Property is selling rapidly and as soon as spring opens building will commence in earnest. Now is the time to invest.

Doings at the Capitol.

Representative Henry Sherman Boutell, who is in the city, said recently that there was no question in his mind as to the attitude of Western Congressmen on the subject of tariff revision, and he predicts that unless there is a decided change of heart on the part of the Eastern members before Congress gets down to work, the next session is likely to witness a very lively fight. "For my part," said Mr. Boutell, "I stand squarely upon the utterances of the late President. There was nothing ambiguous or uncertain about his speech at Buffalo. It indicated clearly, logically and intelligently, a line of procedure for the expansion of our trade, which we cannot ignore. The West stands for the expansion of trade."

Speaking of the war taxes, Mr. Boutell said that he was for their repeal, that they were enacted as a war measure and that the assurance was given by the party in power that they would continue only so long as the war continued. Representative McMillan of Michigan, who has also arrived in Washington, declares that his state is opposed to permitting the Dingley Bill to remain intact. He says that the people of Michigan appreciate that the bill has accomplished much good, but that it has done so in itself an argument that it needs revision so that those industries which it has already placed in an independent position may give place to others more in need of protection.

It is now believed that the President will undertake to satisfy Western Congressmen and their constituents by a forcible recommendation of legislation designed to curtail the power of the trusts and by the exploitation of one or more reciprocity treaties. Mr. Roosevelt is too practical a politician to believe that the demands of the party in the West can be safely ignored, but he considers that a strong rap at the trusts will cause the demands for tariff revision to be modified especially as there will be an attempt on the part of Republican statesmen to show that while the trusts are quite independent of the tariff, the small manufacturer will suffer from any decrease of tariff schedules.

The situation in New York is still the cause of considerable worry both to the President and to some of the Republican leaders. While the President would like to see complete harmony in the state machine he is so opposed to Platt's methods and is so adverse to a compromise in a case where he believes that he is entirely in the right that it is difficult for anyone to influence him.

When Senator Hanna came to Washington he tried to straighten out the tangle and then left for New York to see what he could do at that end. The President is inclined to remove Platt's man Bidwell from the position as Collector of the Port of New York. Odell is urging him to do so and Platt is begging him not to, as is also Secretary Gage, who, rumor has it, will resign in case Bidwell is removed. That rumor, however, is to be taken with a large grain of salt. On the whole Platt finds his influence in his own state waning as never before. That frank "break" of Jerome, when he publicly charged Platt with duplicity in the New York campaign, has been taken very liberally by a good many people and there is a disposition among the New York Republicans to say, "We won, but no thanks to Platt."

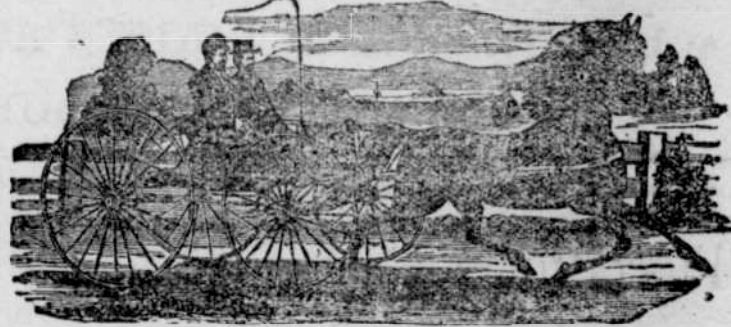
