The C. M. A's Won.

Defeated the Roseburg High School in a Close Game.

Blair Made the Touchdown.

Saturday afternoon the Roseburg High School foot ball team and the C M A team of this place met on the Bellows field at Roseburg. The game was played in 25 minute halves. Captain Griffin won the toss-up and chose the defense of the south goal. Promptly at 2:30 referee Stubling blew the whistle and the game was on. Roseburg kicked 40 yards a quick line up on the 30 yard line was made and a lineplunge by Griffin and a right and left end run by Blair and Jackson advanced the ball 15 yards. Failing to make yardage on the next three downs Roseburg took the ball, but were held for the ball on downs. The C M A's by a series of line bucks and end runs advanced the ball to Roseburg's 25 yard line before losing it. Roseburg then shoved them back 15 yards where the ball remained for fully 10 minutes, neither side being able to advance it, until each of the C M A halves got around the ends for a neat little gain of about 15 yards landing the ball on Roseburg's 25 yard line where it died, the time being up. Score 0 to 0.

The second half the C M A's kicked 35 yards and in this half is where the best playing was done. The oval was pushed back and forth from Roseburg's 35 yard line to the 25 yard line several times. Roseburg at last came to realize that her goal was in danger and punted landing the ball almost in the center of the field. Griffin caught the punt and carried the ball back almost 10 yards and from that time on the High school lads did not get to handle the pigskin. The C M A pushed them down the field to their 45 yard line, when Blair got through for a touchdown, just one minute before time was up. The C M A's failed on a fair catch, consequently a goal was not attempted. Score C M A, 5; R H S, 0.
