The people of Cottage Grove very wisely decided, upon second thought, to encourage our public schools by levying an extra tax for school purposes. Of course there are still a few kickers left. It is always so, though there is little grounds for a kick. One of the most enticing features of our little city to new comers is the fact our indebtedness, as a city, is small and our taxes light in comparison with other towns. Take Albany for instance—A town of less than twice our population,—yet its indebtedness according to the last recorders report is upwards of \$111,000. And in addition to the fact that it supports a College the school district is in debt \$2,000. That the Grove is marching close upon the heels of Albany business point of view is well known. Give to the Grove the business accruing from the county seat sources enjoyed by Albany and it would outstrip the metropolis of Linn county. Some of them own more property than ten men, like them, could properly look after. They want to sell and the only inducement they offer is two prices for their land. Yet they have such confidence in Cottage Grove coming to the front is spite of all they can do to hinder it, they are willing to take two prices for their land, talk Bohemia, Black-butte, Railroad, telephone, talk anything to boom the town, but their labors end. When it comes to act they kick. Look around you gentlemen at other towns, their taxes their debts and then compare them with our own and then be fare with the people and kick yourselves for being a detriment rather than a benefit to your community. If you are not satisfied with present conditions take a reasonable price for your possessions and move to Astoria, to Portland or Albany and see how you like it. Don't think you'll "bust" the Grove by doing it. You will never be missed.
If you can't put your shoulder to the wheel and push get away from the front, "go way back and lay down." Its safer. There are too many good men, men of business, of means, and good sense here who have pushed to the present point and stood the strain like men behind the wheel of progress to let you back the vehicle over them. EDUCATION AND THE REPUBLIC

"How many of our colonists" asked a speaker at the recent meeting of the New York Mothers' Club "could read and write when they had sense enough to protest against England?" And no voice was raised to repel this unwarranted imputation of illiteracy against the fathers and mothers of the Republic.

No American should forget that this has always been a reading and writing nation and that education has made it what it is. Our Dutch colonist came from Europe's most cultured race and at once opened schools in New Amsterdam. The Sweeds in New Jersey, had shared the knowledge which was the birth-right of every Swedish child in the seventeenth century. Of 319 "Scotch-Irish" immigrants in 1698, 306 signed their names. The Quakers of Pennsylvania, the Puritans, the Swiss, the Huguenots, would not have dreamed of freedom and have left Europe to seek it if they had not been educated. In 1665 every town in Massachusetts had its school. One of the first acts of the new nation of public land to support free schools, and under that and later acts lands exceeding in area all Great Britain and Ireland have been so used to make education universal.

The leaders of our Revolution were perhaps the most remarkable group of men who ever combined culture and eloquence with courage common sense. But there would have been no people for them to lead if the rudest cabins in the wilderness had no sheltered men who could read by rushlight or flickering pine torch of freedom, and resolve that they would win it for themselves and their children's children forever.

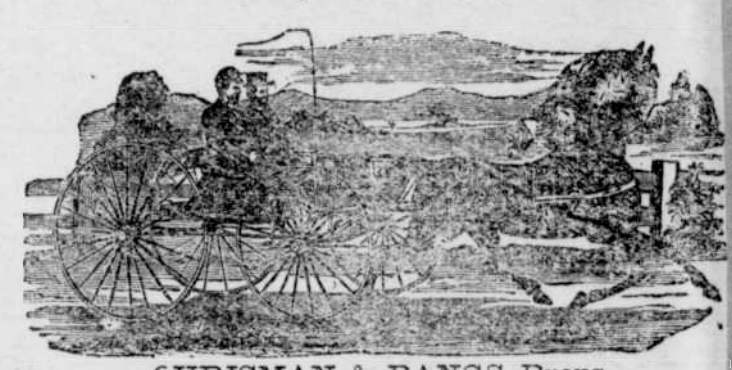
