THE TAX CARRIED.

There was present at the school meeting, last Friday the largest gathering of school patrons that ever assembled at any similar meeting in this district. The meeting was called to order at 2 o'clock by chairman Bennett of the board of directors and the object of the meeting stated. County Superintendent Miller was present and made a few remarks, briefly explaining why Cottage Grove had not received as much money this year as in previous years, notwithstanding the fact that there are more children in the district at present than ever before. The ballot was ordered about 2:15 and the poles remained open until 4 p m. There were 200 votes cast of which number 156 favored the extra 5-mill tax and 44 opposed it.
It is hoped that the papers throughout the country who called us moss backs, etc, will take notice of the result of this election and give Cottage Grove the credit she deserves. Our citizens, or at least a greater majority of them are progressive people and we wish the outside world to know that we have the second best school in the county and we mean to maintain it.
Monday morning the school house doors were again thrown open and the hundreds of children who were anxiously awaiting were again allowed to come in and our public schools were again in session.
It is to be hoped that such a state of affairs regarding our schools will never again occur.
