Suit for \$10,000 Damages.
Rudolph, through his lawyer, L Bilyeu, has commenced in the Lane county circuit court at the Booth—Kelly Lumber \$10,000 damages for injuries sustained while he was in the employ of the defendant on the second day of 1900.

The plaintiff was injured by the explosion of the boiler of a donkey engine. According to the complaint, the plaintiff's right arm was broken, and scalded; he was struck on the head and on and about the face and injured in the head and neck; he was terribly burned and scalded on the back and breast and both arms and legs, was rendered unconscious and suffered a great deal; he suffered permanent injury to his head and nervous system and his hearing has been greatly impaired, etc.

The plaintiff alleges that the engine was defective, which fact was proven to the company before the accident.

This is the accident in which two men, Otto Anlauf and Otto Fredson were killed outright and is remembered by Leader readers.

Robbed a Sick Man.
Undoubtedly the meanest man on the coast is in Cottage Grove. There are some hopes for a man who took his revolver and "hold up" a fellow man on the highway and took him of his money. This will give a total delegation of 190 in this convention. East Cottage Grove the largest precinct in the county will be entitled to 8 delegates and west Cottage Grove, 7 delegates.

The date of primaries was set for March 29 and the County Convention for April 5. More interest was manifested in the committee meeting than is usual and a large and enthusiastic convention is assured. No candidates appeared and the total absence of the appearance of a ready-made-up slate augurs well for the convention. This is as it should be. Let the office seek the man. When that becomes the rule in politics we will have better officers and officers of the people's choosing and not of cliques and bosses.
